Child Therapy

COBYS has five therapists who can provide therapeutic services for children from age four through adolescents.

When counseling our youngest clients, COBYS' therapists use play therapy where they act out behavioral scenarios with which the children are having difficulty, modeling appropriate behavior and actions.

Just as there has been an increased awareness of the effects of trauma on the lives of adults, our trained and licensed therapists are also able to provide trauma focused care using Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT). TF-CBT is an evidence-based treatment for children and adolescents who have experienced trauma. It allows their parents or caregivers to be a part of the healing process.

An overarching necessity for success in providing therapy to young children is the engagement of parents and caregivers from the child's entire community. This community includes teachers, school counselors and other professional service providers.

LET THE LITTLE CHILDREN COME:

Counseling for Our Youngest Clients

Joy* was placed into foster care as an infant and developed a strong and secure attachment to her foster parents. When she was a young child, her father was identified through paternity tests and he began actively pursuing reunification with his daughter. Joy was exhibiting high levels of anxiety during visits with her father and separating from her foster mother.

Joy started therapy at COBYS, along with her foster mother and birth father, to help her develop more comfort with her father and less anxiety separating from her foster mother. This level of comfort

gradually developed over time through play therapy. After about three months of receiving care, Joy had developed a positive and trusting relationship with her father and moved into his home without distress.

The beautiful part of this story is how supportive the foster mother was in helping Joy to build a relationship with her father, and the positive relationship the

foster family and birth father developed. Before ending therapy, the birth father expressed his deep appreciation to the foster family for giving Joy such a good start in life and asked them to continue to be involved in her life as her godparents.

Because of therapy provided by COBYS, the selfless care received from her COBYS Resource Parents and the loving care of her father, Joy was able to experience a smooth transition and have two families who love and support her.

As the story of Joy illustrates, it is important to recognize that therapy can be very beneficial for young children, not just adolescents and adults. Parents should be proactive in getting children care when they see a problem developing. That way, kids can have an established therapy provider, and as they age, they can return for check-ups with a trusted person, maximizing their chances of thriving as they grow and develop.

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We're Still Here



Things at COBYS have become a bit more challenging during this Coronavirus pandemic, as I am sure they have been for all of you at work, at home and in almost every aspect of life. At COBYS, we transitioned to a remote service delivery model beginning on March 16. Required foster care visits are being completed through video technology such as FaceTime, Skype and Zoom. Therapists are continuing to provide service to clients through teletherapy. While all in-person group meetings have been canceled for at least the next few weeks, family life

educators are checking in with class participants, making sure that adults and children continue to receive education materials and care. While delivering care during the COVID-19 crisis is not ideal, the staff at COBYS are making every effort to ensure that our clients continue to receive quality, personal care, no matter the circumstance.

The services we provide at COBYS can continue since they are currently deemed life-sustaining by the government, but it has not always been the case that what we do is deemed essential.

I said it in 2015 and I will say it again, what we do is absolutely essential. And I will add that what we do is also "life-sustaining."

In 2015, Pennsylvania State government didn't pass its budget until nearly nine months after it was due. During those months, COBYS was not paid for many of the services we provided because the state considered us "non-essential." (I wrote about this in the Winter, 2015 edition of this newsletter. I am confident that most of you still have that edition at the ready and will refer back to it. Okay, I don't really think that. And since I am writing about this again, it is obvious that I still have significant issues with the state classifying what we do as "non-essential.")

I find it interesting that today, in the midst of the Coronavirus, COBYS is allowed to remain open because the state considers what we do "life-sustaining." So, if this crisis would happen beginning July 1 in a year when the budget doesn't pass, the state wouldn't pay us for many of our services because we are "non-essential," but we would be allowed to remain open because our business is "life-sustaining." I said it in 2015 and I will say it again, what we do is absolutely essential. And I will add that what we do is also "life-sustaining."

Just ask the kids who now have a safe place to sleep each night with our Resource Families. Ask the kids who now have a forever home through adoption. Ask the families who are learning positive ways of interacting with their kids. Ask our counseling clients who receive services that have brought them healing and peace in their lives. I'm confident all these people would say that what COBYS provides is essential and life-sustaining. I am also confident that each of you believes in the work COBYS is doing. We thank you for your continued commitment to our essential and life-sustaining services.

The COBYS anniversary year celebration continues as we remember our second decade.

The 90s-Expanding to Meet the Need

The 90s was a decade of activity, expansion and growth. Recognizing that COBYS serves people of all ages through a variety of programs, in May 1990 the organization's name was changed to COBYS Family Services, no longer an acronym of Church of the Brethren Youth Services.

In mid-1990, the board voted to purchase the "Old Mill" where COBYS had been renting space. Through the decade, counseling centers opened around the county, new programs and classes were launched and fundraising events were introduced.


Services shifted to meet the demands for the kind of care that best served the children and families in need of our services. A group home was purchased for the Boys Group home ministry, and remodeled by volunteers only to see that ministry end after almost a decade. In its place, a Teen Mother & Child Group Home was opened.

In 1997, COBYS was licensed as an adoption agency by the Statewide Adoption Network (SWAN), and that same year was named Pennsylvania Agency of the Year by the Pennsylvania Foster Parent Association.

The end of the decade saw the launch of the Family Nurturing Education and Support Program. The Reunification Program partnership (soon after renamed the Permanency Unit) with the Lancaster Children and Youth Social Services Agency was established.

Through the expansion and growth of the decade, COBYS provided more, targeted and adapted service to care for each child with the continuity of care as if they were our only child.




