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# The ZOELLER BUINCH An Adoption Story

## Here's the story...

For Louis and Melissa Zoeller, life in their home is always in motion. They recently finalized the adoption of three siblings, Izabel, Oaklee and Carson, completing the Zoeller Bunch of seven children. The couple, married for more than 15 years, lives with their family in Mountville. In addition to the three children just adopted, oldest, biological children Coral and Dominic provide loving sibling guidance to Sophie and Tatum, who had previously joined the family through adoption. If that doesn't sound like a busy enough household, the family animals include 11 chickens, five ducks, two dogs, two geckos and a cat. With years of experience providing foster care and growing their family through adoption, Louis and Melissa have wisdom to share about their experiences.

## What are your reasons for fostering and adopting?

We started fostering because we felt a calling from God. When we first started dating, we both had a desire to adopt. We heard about COBYS from a friend, went to the informational meeting and the rest is history. After our first adoption we continued to keep our home open because we saw a need

and we knew we were able to provide the love, support and time to continue fostering.

## What are some aspects of providing foster care that have been most rewarding for you? What has been most challenging?

The most rewarding would be the increase of our family. The most challenging is learning to parent children with early childhood trauma. Also, not always agreeing with the decisions that are made for the children in care.

## What impacts of the legal system have you seen on the children in your care?

At times the decisions that are made in a court room cause more short-term

trauma on the children with the whole purpose of seeing if the family can step up to parent. The system that was designed to protect the safety and welfare of children is not always serving the actual child's safety. It is difficult to walk the system knowing, at times, the judge, lawyers, caseworkers, bio parents and Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) are not in agreement on the case plan.

## What have you learned about children through the process of fostering?

We have learned that no two children, regardless of age or circumstances entering care, are alike. We must meet the individual need of each child and their trauma.

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
## **Final Thoughts**

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What have you learned about yourself, individually and as a couple, during your foster care journey?

We have learned we need to be on the same page as much as possible as a couple. Kids with early childhood trauma are very resilient and can be good at causing divides to get their perceived needs met. Louis, has learned that patience is a need while I, Melissa, have learned that our family and myself can survive a tidal wave of overwhelming things and come out strong on the other end. At the end of the day, we always made it through. I also learned to make my voice heard no matter what, and to create healthy boundaries, otherwise you will burn out fast.

## What role did your faith play in your decision to foster children? Is there a particular Bible verse that sustains you?

As far as our faith, I have no idea how people foster without Christ. There have been more times than I can count where we needed to completely rely on God knowing best, because what we were seeing play out was not okay or right. We pray Numbers 6:24-26 over all our children each night. "The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious



SUMMIT



At COBYS, our focus this year across the services we deliver continues to be trauma-informed care. To meet the increasingly complex needs of our children and youth in foster care, as well as those children, youth and adults in the wider community, our staff receive on-going training in best practices, allowing them to provide the COBYS Difference in care. This report details the specifics of training and of services provided, as well as trends we observed during this past fiscal year (July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023).

Our 110 staff members are called to serve through delivery of necessary care to sometimes messy and often heartbreaking situations. We do all this in order that we might fulfill our mission, that motivated by Christian faith, we educate, support, and empower children and adults to reach their full potential.

**Adoption.** The COBYS Adoption unit provides a range of services that assist children and families during the adoption process, in finalization of adoptions and in the life-long journey for families who have experienced adoption. Our adoption team works with children of all ages, all of whom have experienced difficult life experiences which have led to


their need for Pennsylvania Statewide Adoption and Permanency Network (SWAN) services. Referrals for children and families to receive services from COBYS have been relatively consistent with last year.

The following units of service were provided:

- 16 child specific recruitments
- 73 child preparations
- 146 child profiles
- 19 family profiles
- 27 adoption finalizations
- 41 families served with post adoption services

To date 653 adoptions have been finalized by COBYS.

**Counseling.** This past year, the Counseling department continued to provide sessions both in person and through teletherapy. This has reduced barriers for our clients such as transportation issues and difficult work schedules that can make attending on-going appointments a challenge. With teletherapy, the clients can have a session during

- 89 new clients served
- 134 successful discharges of clients

Permanency. COBYS is contracted by the Lancaster County Children and Youth Social Service Agency to act as the county caseworker, working with parents and families on their court approved plans for reunification. We help parents access court-required services to work towards children returning to their custody. We also assure the safety of children in their out-of-home placements. The program promotes a stronger and more stable family unit and helps families understand their needs and requirements. The goal is for families to reunify whenever safely possible.

During this past year, staff in our Permanency Unit walked alongside children and families, resulting in the following:

- 143 children from 105 families served
- 16 children from 13 families were reunified
- Eight children from six families were released to a legal guardian through subsidized permanent legal custodianship
- 20 children from 15 families were transferred to adoption Three children from two families were released to fit and willing relatives

The Permanency team saw a big increase this year in children released from care through permanent legal custodianship/fit and willing relative. It is believed this is due to the increase in kinship families with whom Permanency is working. When a child is released through legal custodianship, parental rights are not terminated. Often times, we find that relatives who gain custody of children do not want parental rights terminated, therefore the child is not adopted. Additionally, we are working with a larger population of adolescents and teenagers who do not wish to be adopted. Youth get to make that decision at the age of 12 and if they chose not to be adopted, we look to obtain permanency through legal custodianship, if reunification cannot occur.

**Foster Care.** Foster Care provides stability and safety for foster children in need of comprehensive and compassionate care. This often includes providing resources, advocating for the child's needs, and accompanying families as they navigate new experiences and varying emotions.

Foster Care statistics for the past year:

- 23,244 days of care to 151 children
- 92 children were placed with COBYS foster families
- 28 sibling groups and nine medically needy children were served
- 82 children were discharged from care, 22 of these to parents or other relatives
- 12 foster children in our care were adopted, while 11 were discharged to other places
- 101 foster families served, including 16 new foster families who were approved and 27 who concluded service
- Six pre-service training classes were held, educating 25 families interested in being foster/adoptive parents

A focus in support of foster families this year included training 55 families in Trust Based Relational Intervention (TBRI), a parenting approach focused on caring for children with trauma and attachment challenges. Foster families also benefit from a Resource Parent Trainer who provides individualized training tailored to the special needs of specific foster children in a home. Finally, we continue to see a high need for foster families for teens, who were 46% of referrals in the year, as well as families willing to take sibling groups.

Family Life Education. This year, FLE continued to offer a broad range of programs. While we are best known for our parenting courses, all our programs share the common goal of providing parents, other adults, teens and children with information and skills to foster cooperation, courage, responsibility, self-esteem and respect.

In partnership with the Blues Program developer, we piloted Project ME, the new Blues Program curriculum for middle school students in two schools and one church. We were able to serve 26 youth in grades 7-9 through these programs. COBYS continues to be the exclusive national trainer of trainers for The Blues Program, which focuses on teens grades 8-12 and teaches emotional resilience as well as reduces low mood and anxious thoughts.

Three of our staff, Barb Paynter, Lisa Stoltzfus, and Jaime Leuthy, attended the Trust Based Relational Intervention (TBRI) practitioner training in Utah this spring bringing our total number of practitioners to five, allowing us to broaden our TBRI offerings to all Lancaster County and several surrounding county's foster families.

FLE statistics for the past year:

- 816 classroom hours (13% increase from last year)
- 754 adults, representing over 650 children (60% increase in adults served from last year)
- 49 courses held including: Blues Program, Kinship Program, Incredible Years Autism, Parenting Wisely, Seeking Safety and TBRI program

**Financial Support.** Significant generosity in financial giving from donors to COBYS Family Services was evident this past year. In addition to gifts from individuals, churches and businesses, we received special donations which allowed for upgrades to technology and the purchase of a newish car. These gifts mean our staff can more efficiently access information from wherever they are delivering care and can safely travel to meet the needs of children and adolescents.

We continue to focus on quality, multi-channel communication with our donors, providing a variety of

opportunities to connect to our ministries, from general giving to the COBYS Care Fund and even the Kids' Closet. We hope our donors, who join us in the call to serve children and families, appreciate a balance of success stories of kids and families, along with the real and very challenging realities of our work. While the needs we are addressing will never go away, we believe our care is making a real difference in the lives of those we serve.
